



Owner Request: Pet owners experiencing financial hardship, or who receive financial assistance (i.e. Social Security, Disability) requested an appointment to have their pet humanely put to sleep.

Health: The animal did not respond to medical treatment for illness or arrived with a contagious health issue.

Behavior: The most common behavior issues surround failure to use litterbox for cats, possession issues (food, toy) for dogs.

Aggression: The animal is not handleable by Animal Control staff, has a history of aggression and/or biting, and/or poses a high risk to public safety if placed for adoption.

Sick/Injured: The animal was sick and/or injured upon its arrival at Animal Control, was suffering and/or was not treatable.

Rabies Exposure: Rabies vector wildlife; domestic animals without a known rabies vaccination history known to have been exposed to rabies vector wildlife; animals that arrive with puncture wounds of an unknown source; animals that have inflicted a bite wound on a person and must be tested for public health and safety.

Underage: Orphaned, unweaned animals that cannot survive on their own are humanely euthanized when wildlife rehab, foster care, or other means of required care are unavailable in a timely manner.
